



CONJUNCTIONS CONNECT!

Conjunctions connect! But what does that really mean? Conjunctions are those words in a sentence that connect ideas together and indicate a relationship between thoughts. They are used to combine thoughts and sentences. There are different types of conjunctions that are defined by their different functions but the most important thing to remember is that a conjunction links one part of a sentence or idea. Joiner.


